We were overwhelmed to find out last Monday that we won \$5000 from the Sea FM School of the Year competition.

This competition is run across the NW of the state and we were competing against 14 other schools. To win, we had to have the most votes (anyone in the community could vote for our school).

A huge thank you to anyone who voted for us. Having this additional \$5000 means that we can inject more money into our reading resources. Improved reading outcomes is a priority of our school and

the state government. To be lucky enough to have additional money for additional books to help our students to learn to read and to enjoy reading is so good. This is also the gift that keeps on giving, because students for years to come will benefit from the books that we purchase.

Mrs King is now on a spending spree, trying to find the right books for our school. Well done also to the P & F, who actually nominated our school to begin with. The credit goes mostly to you.





The survey results are in and it is GOOD NEWS!

Now I have to be careful when sharing survey news, because it is important that we don't get too far ahead of ourselves and also that we understand the context of the surveys. Each year we have 3 surveys conducted:

- 1. Family Satisfaction Survey (open to all families with students in the school)
- 2. Staff Satisfaction Survey (open to all staff)
- 3. Student Wellbeing and Engagement Survey (all students from Year 4 6)

This week I will focus on the Family Satisfaction Survey and then I will spend the next two Newsletters explaining the data from the other two surveys. This year a third of our families completed the survey, this is the most we have had in the last 10 years, so thank you to those who filled the survey out. This was conducted online. 34 questions are asked and families rate the school for each question. The questions range from how staff treat their children, to the school leadership, to the academic focuses of the school through to our school culture. For each question we get an indication of how many families agree/disagree and also an overall mark out of 10 for each question. We can compare our results to the Tasmanian government schools average and also compare it to our previous two years. The results in a snapshot show the following:



- -The graph shows that overall, we are ahead of the state average and also well ahead of where we were two years ago.
- -We are above the state average on all questions except for one.
- -Our highest rating is that families believe they can talk to their child's teacher about their concerns.
- -Another high rating includes that this school is well maintained (thank you to Rodney, Katrina, Joan and Leanne).
- Our other high ratings include that staff expect their child to do their best, that staff treat students fairly, my child feels safe at school, my child likes being at this

school, the school looks for ways to improve, staff motivate my child to learn, my child's learning needs are being met, this school is well organised, there is effective educational leadership, staff are interested in my child's wellbeing, this school is preparing students for their future, I would recommend this school to others, people from diverse backgrounds are respected at this school, students with disabilities are supported in this school.


Rather than go on and on, on our next page you will see the results for themselves. If something needs improving or is too low, it will be coloured red and if something is going well, then it will be a teal colour. As you can see, we have no red and nearly all teal. One target we had set for 2023 was to improve our rating for Q32 so that families felt more included in their child's literacy and numeracy learning. I am pleased to say that we didn't just meet our target, but we exceeded it.

MANAGING SAFEGUARDING RISKS IN OUR SCHOOLS

Our staff play a key role in keeping students safe by proactively monitoring any risks.

The Department for Education, Children and Young People (DECYP) recently released new Safeguarding Risk Management resources for our schools to assist with this.

These resources are designed to help us continuously identify, prevent and reduce risks to students of child abuse and harm, and support our school to be a safe environment where every child and young person can thrive and grow.

During this term we will be developing a Safeguarding Risk Management plan for our school. The plan sets out the risks that we can identify, and most importantly, how we can reduce them.

As parents and carers, you play an important role helping us to identify safeguarding risks in our school, and I'm sure you may also have ideas on how we can reduce these risks to keep students safe.

If you or your child/children have any questions, concerns or wish to report any incidents relating to child abuse or harm, I encourage you to reach out to me or a trusted staff member. We welcome your views and any feedback.

The <u>Tell Someone website</u> is also another useful source of information if you are worried that a child may be at risk of harm or is being sexually abused or groomed.

If you have any concerns, the website gives clear information about what to look for, how to make a report and who to speak to.
