Key Word Sign

Key word sign (KWS) is a communication technique that uses speech and sign together to help support children and adults communicate. It is a strategy used for people with communication difficulties to get their message across to others.

KWS provides visual information alongside speech, which can assist visual learners. Learning KWS can help reduce the levels of frustration by a child who can't express their needs and wants.

The key words in a message are signed. KWS is not a sign language, but it borrows the signs from the sign language of the country it is used in.

At Smithton Primary school we are working towards implementing KWS across the whole school.

Sign of the Week

Learn and use Key Word Sign (KWS) with sign of the week. Try using this sign in different situations, with many people this week. You can also learn other signs.



go

Swing slightly cupped dominant hand forward in relevant direction. Finish with straight fingers. *With directionality.

What you might say when using this sign:

Let's go!

X has to go.

What is KWS?

KWS is a type of Alternative and Augmentative Communication (AAC). It is a strategy to support people with communication difficulties. KWS borrows signs from the local sign language. In Australia, this is Auslan.

How do I use KWS?

- 1. Sign and talk at the same time
- 2. Sign the key words while saying the whole sentence
- 3. Use other visual strategies:
 - o body language
 - o natural gestures
 - facial expression
 - o directionality and placement (sign production features used in Auslan)
 - some finger spelling

Summer Safety Alert: Protecting Our Little Ones

As summer approaches, it's important to remember that drowning is a leading cause of accidental death among Australian children. To keep young children safe around backyard swimming pools, follow these four key actions from the Royal Life Saving Australia's Keep Watch campaign: Supervise, Restrict, Teach, and Respond.

Supervise: Always keep a close watch on children around water.

Restrict: Ensure pool areas are securely fenced and access is restricted.

Teach: Educate children about water safety and swimming skills.

Respond: Be prepared to act quickly in case of an emergency.

Installing a pool safety barrier

If your swimming pool or spa can hold a depth of water of 300mm (30cm) or more, there is a requirement for it to be surrounded by a compliant barrier. The owner may only install the pool, which includes an inflatable or relocatable pool, after a safety barrier is installed.

This requirement applies to pools and spas installed from 1994 onwards. Owners of pools built before 1994 are encouraged to install and maintain a pool safety barrier to protect their own safety and that of the community.

The requirement applies to:

- In-ground pools
- Indoor pools (excluding bathroom spa-baths)
- Above ground pools
- Inflatable and relocatable pools
- Wading pools holding 300mm (30cm) of water
- Hot tubs/spas

In Tasmania, the installation of pool safety barriers must be performed by a licensed builder and overseen by a licensed building surveyor.


